In the last few month we have had re-enrollment for the next school year, summer school enrollment, partnership projects and the subsequent breakfast, parent night, public open house and a fundraiser. And now we start to wrap up the the school year and get ready for parent conferences, classroom open house, primary graduations and summer school.

A short review on the happenings here. Our re-enrollment was overall very good. We have a solid group of returning students in all of our classrooms. That makes for a consistent and strong start in the new school year. The new children come into beautiful working environments and it really helps with their adjustment. The examples of children working joyfully are there for the new children from day one.

We also had a good summer school sign-up and our classes will be full and the children can continue with their beautiful work. We will also be scheduling at least one field trip that includes a bus ride that always seems to be the highlight of the trip. Also during summer school, will be provided with our own schedule of swimming lessons for children 4 years old and older at Elder Park. The Monterey Park Parks and Recreation Department is such a wonderful partner with us in providing this for our students. You will receive more information on the field trip and swim lessons soon if you enrolled your child for summer school.

During our re-enrollment time, the primary graduates spent a few mornings in the elementary classroom working on projects with the elementary students. The children really enjoyed being and working in the "big kid's class" and completed some great projects. We then had a breakfast in the classroom for all of the students and their parents so that the children could share their projects. It was a fun and joyful morning and for many of our primary parents, the first time they got to be in the elementary classroom.

Our parent night was a little less attended then usual but we also had much rain that week and that day. Still, the parents that were able to attend received some great information from the teachers and they had some great questions.

Our public open house was a huge success and we had over 35 families stop by. Parents had great questions and were really intrigued by what they saw in the classrooms and what they learned about Montessori education. We received many applications that day for new students to start in summer school and fall of this year and quite a few for the 2024 summer and fall. Mr. Mindes' Class

Hello Meher families! March and April brought with it a number of events. We held the Partnership Breakfast, a Back-to-School night, and a Saturday Open House. We also hosted two Montessori teachers-in-training and some non-Montessori educators. The Montessori teachers-in-training came to fulfill requirements for their teaching credential, while the non-Montessori educators simply came to observe our class. Afterwards, the educators (which included a school psychologist) commented on how impressed they were watching happy and lively students interacting with each other and their work. Their words reminded me to step back and appreciate the engagement and joy found in our Montessori classroom!

The Partnership Breakfast and Montessori "Periods of Development"

After the changes and adaptations our classes made to negotiate the pandemic, the Partnership Breakfast felt like a stride back to normalcy. Our students had the opportunity to work with the Primary students in preparing for the event. I thought seeing the younger students work with our students underscored Maria Montessori's description of the different stages of development for children. Generally, she broke human development into 4 periods: primary (ages 0 to 6); elementary (ages 7 -12); adolescence (ages 13 -18); and adulthood (18+).

Characteristics of the 2nd period Elementary child (7 - 12)

At the Back-to-School Night, we spoke about, among other things, the characteristics of the second period Elementary child - our students! I want to briefly mention three main characteristics of the 7 - 12 year olds that Maria Montessori delineated and that we discussed.

1) The Elementary student has a desire to escape the



closed environment. No longer consumed with internal growth like the Primary student, the Elementary student is interested in a wider social and societal experience. Montessori initiated the "going out," as one element of the curriculum to support this characteristic.

- 2) The Elementary student passage to abstract thinking, which explains the Elementary child's oft-asked question "Why"?
- 3) The birth of an internal moral sense.

The Montessori lessons and materials

While Montessori may not be the only educational theorist to divide human development into four stages, her eponymous method was constructed specifically for a child's stage of development. In other words, , the Montessori materials, its lessons, and class structure are formulated to fit the traits of Primary, Elementary, and adolescent students.

Speaking of lessons!

These last couple of months the students received lessons in identifying the subject and predicate, verb tenses (present, past, and future), polygons, lines, rays, segments, quadrilaterals, river nomenclature and function, structure of the earth, fraction operations (division, multiplication, addition, and subtraction), functions of the leaf ... I'm realizing the list is a long one, so let's just say there has been a lot of learning going on!



Community Helpers

As the long days of spring bring more outings and adventures, which lead to more community interactions overall, I thought April was a good month to discuss community helpers in class. We read books about what a community helper is. The simplest definition was that a "community helper is someone who makes the neighborhood cleaner, safer or better." Another reason April is a good month to highlight community helpers is because it can be tied into Earth Day, which was April 22nd. By making our communities cleaner, safer, or better, we are also taking care of our Earth. We even had a special community helpers edition of Show and Tell! A few Meher families shared items from their jobs that fit the community helper definition. The children enjoyed bringing in something that mom or dad uses on the job and then explaining what it was and why their parent uses it. The children got to see life-saving tools for babies, plans for trains and buses, and a conductor's wand/baton for the philharmonic.

Several books in our classroom library have pictures of a wide variety of community helpers. I chose these books because they include non-stereotypical portrayals of varying community helpers. Female firefighters and doctors, male nurses and teachers send powerful visual messages to young children, letting them know their gender does not determine their career path. I also ensured the books depicted people of color, differing abilities, and a broad age range. These qualities have always been my focus in selecting books for the class library. It is of the utmost importance that the children are exposed to representation of all walks of life in a positive way at this time.



In the Classroom

There has been a lot of growth, development, and exploration happening in the classroom. Children are excited to observe their peers and then eager to ask me for the same lesson after a few days of observation. You can always tell when a Montessori child is getting ready to observe a classmate by how they instinctively place their hands behind their backs as they approach the other child's workspace.

Allowing children to observe their peers is essential to a Montessori classroom. This is also one of the reasons why Montessori classrooms are mixed-age environments. I can only imagine how boring it must be for these young, developing minds to be in a classroom where everyone is doing the same thing! The free-flowing, mixed-age environment allows children to support each other in the classroom, revisit materials they have long since mastered, and dive deeper into materials with extended lessons. Many children have been bringing their Kindness Cards back to have me read them aloud to their classmates. I encourage the children to do this. It helps their classmates recognize kindness and sends the message that even the little things count. When I fill out a kindness card, I do not tell the

child they are getting one. It is meant to be a surprise in the mail. Therefore, please be sure we have your child's current address to ensure they receive their card in the mail. If your address has changed, there is a yellow change of information form on the coat rack you may fill out.

Next Month

Our second round of Parent-Teacher Conferences and our Open House for families will happen in May. Look for those emails later in the month.

I want to close out this newsletter with the word "yet." When your child tells you, "I can't..." or "I don't know how to..." Follow up their sentence with the word "yet." Such a small word can make a massive difference in your child's approach to challenging tasks in life.
